Here are some highlights from our schools this week:

Pine Island Elementary School

Students in Aimee Urvater's class just completed a unit on The Needs and Wants of Living Things. To celebrate the end of this unit, the class invited Animal Control Officer Joany Schmick from the Warwick Humane Society to their class. The students generated a list of interview questions to learn more about the specific needs and wants of the animals at the shelter. Joany brought two eight-week-old kittens with her when she visited the class. Based on Joany's responses to their interview questions, students will donate a basket filled with the needs and wants of the animals at the shelter. Students loved having Joany and her kittens visit their class, and they will soon return the favor when a "basket of needs and wants" is delivered to the Humane Center.

Park Avenue Elementary School

First- and second-grade students participated in the Mad Science assembly sponsored and organized by the Park Avenue Elementary School PTA. The Mad Science instructor covered various topics, such as the attributes of liquids, solids, and gasses, theatrically and engagingly. Students had the opportunity to witness firsthand the exciting chemical reactions as they unfolded before their eyes!

During their art classes, second-grade students learn about Eric Carle and his process of making a collage. Students watched an informative documentary that described the sources and origins of Carle's inspiration. They also learned about the artist's process when creating his beloved stories and illustrations. Currently, students are working on creating their springtime collages following a similar approach. They began with a painting party that included painting many sheets of paper with different colors and textures. Next, students sourced neutral colors from old magazines and drafted their springtime drawings. Students quickly demonstrated how to collage the areas of their pictures. Lastly, Lisa Martimucci emphasized how students could use all their scraps, so there is no waste!

Lastly, the PTA also sponsored this year's Someone Special Dance. The event took place outside in the bus parking lot. This year's theme was Fiesta! The PTA invited all of our students to bring their choice of "someone special" to join them for the party. The PTA supplied refreshments,

decorations, and a D.J. who kept the party fun. Families brought their chairs and enjoyed themselves dancing and watching their children have fun.

Sanfordville Elementary School

Sanfordville held the Fourth Grade Spelling Bee Finals sponsored by the Warwick Rotary Club. Earlier in April, the local Rotarians visited the fourth-grade classes to give them dictionaries to read and use as a resource. The fourth-grade students took a written test in class, and the earners of the top five scores advanced to an oral spelling bee in their classroom. The class winners then went to the grade level final. Twenty finalists competed to crown a champion speller. The top 5 spellers were Daniel O'Shea, Zoe Fong, Ben Larkin, Rex Heymer, and Sabrina Dinu. The second-place winner was Rex Heymer, and the champion of the Sanfordville 2022 Warwick Rotary Spelling Bee was Sabrina Dinu! The second-graders are learning about how good authors paint pictures in their readers' minds through the words they write. Students were able to study paintings to see what they noticed about the scene, looking at what the artist was trying to portray without words. They identified what was happening, where it was happening, the feelings conveyed, and more. Students collaborated with classmates to discuss the pictures their independent reading book authors were creating. This practice helps students become better readers and writers.

Warwick Valley Middle School

The Middle School inducted approximately 40 new members into the Warwick Valley Chapter of the National Junior Honor Society (NJHS). Our NJHS was established six years ago. Students are considered for membership based on their leadership, citizenship, character, service, and academic achievement. Our recent induction ceremony highlighted the group's accomplishments throughout the year while welcoming its new members. Warwick Valley High School

Over two weeks, 593 Advanced Placement (AP) examinations were administered to students in the areas of US Government and Politics, Chemistry, Environmental Science, Psychology, English Literature and Composition, Computer Science A, Statistics, United States History, Calculus BC, Computer Science Principles, English Language and Composition, Physics Mechanics, Physics Electricity and Magnetism, Biology, and World History. Students have been taking AP courses and preparing for these exams throughout the year. The AP exams are offered around the world and culminate in rigorous college-level coursework. The opportunity to receive college credit for successful completion of their coursework is dependent on the students' performances on these exams. Students from Warwick Valley High School have the opportunity to graduate from the high school with over 30 college credits through AP coursework and college-level courses.
