Here are some highlights from our schools this week:

Park Avenue Elementary School

Park Avenue's guidance counselors and school psychologist have been busy laying the groundwork for success by educating students about our Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) ROAR matrix. They visited classrooms to teach students about our expectations and to describe opportunities for students to earn "Golden Tickets" as an acknowledgment of their positive behavior. In addition, the team has been working hard to train staff on the importance of a universal approach to this system. They reviewed strategies with our lunch monitors and bus drivers to increase student engagement in areas outside the classroom. We are confident these efforts will provide students with the best chance to become responsible and ethical citizens inside and outside the school building.

Sanfordville Elementary School

In Sanfordville, the district's PBIS initiative is represented in the schoolwide P.A.W.S. Behaviors program. Students learn about the school's behavioral expectations through classroom lessons, push-in lessons by our counselors, grade-level events, trimester celebrations, and special activities throughout the year. Positive behavior is continually reinforced through the use of our P.A.W.S. Bear Hug Ticket Rewards System.

The school PBIS team, along with the faculty and staff, have identified expectations - being polite, being accountable, making wise choices, and thinking safety first - as being most critical for the students to demonstrate. It is the school's goal to make the understanding of the P.A.W.S. expectations as clear and easy for children as possible. In a positive manner, the matrix tells children what to do and how to behave in order to abide by the four expectations in the various areas of the school - classroom, hallway, cafeteria, bus, bathroom, and playground. Students will receive ongoing training about following these expectations and be rewarded for their positive behavior individually as well as in school-wide celebrations.

Warwick Valley Middle School

Warwick Valley Middle School held its Meet the Teacher Night for our students in grades 5 and 6. Parents were invited into the building to follow their child's schedule for the evening. Parents had the opportunity to move through their child's nine-period day and meet their teachers. Upon arriving at each class, parents were greeted by faculty and provided with a brief overview of expectations and course outlines. The school's Wildcat Ambassadors guided parents in the right direction when they needed assistance in the hallways. We are looking forward to our seventh and eighth grade parents joining us on Thursday, September 22, 2022, for their Meet the Teacher Night.
