WVCSD EdTalk: May 10, 2023

During the Board of Education meeting on Thursday, May 4th, the Board members and I had the honor of listening to students who will be graduating in June with a Seal of Civic Readiness affixed to their diplomas. Five students summarized their Civic Readiness Capstone research projects as part of their responsibilities to earn the seal. Their topics ranged from how social media affects politics to redistricting and gerrymandering.

The Seal of Civic Readiness is a formal recognition granted by the New York State Education Department that a student has achieved a high level of proficiency in civic knowledge, skills, mindset, and experiences. This academic recognition opportunity is open to all graduating seniors across the state. To receive the Seal of Civic Readiness, a student must complete all requirements for a New York State local or Regents' diploma and earn six points by completing tasks in two categories: Civic Knowledge and Civic Participation. The ways to earn these points include taking four credits of social studies, taking advanced social studies courses, and demonstrating proficiency and/or mastery on the Regents exam. Earning Civic Participation points entails civics projects, elective courses promoting civic engagement, and service-learning projects. Students can also complete a four-point capstone project, in which they identify a local civic problem, study it, come up with and/or try out a solution, and then take action to solve it. Having the Seal of Civic Readiness on a high school diploma indicates to potential employers and college admissions officers that the student values civic engagement and scholarship, has a commitment to take part in the local community and government, and possesses a sense of civic responsibility and values.

If a high school student is interested in working toward their Seal of Civic Readiness, the student should talk to his or her social studies teacher and guidance counselor to learn more about this exciting opportunity next year.

Park Avenue Elementary School

The members of the fourth-grade orchestra and band, under the direction of Keely Blaikner and Ryan Muehlbauer, are busy with their final preparations for the upcoming concert. Students will ensure that their package checks off the following functions of a package: appealing display, clear communication, and protection and preservation of the product. It must also be a container for the product, and consumers must be able to carry it. Student teams will also have a budget for purchasing their materials. After creating the package, student teams will analyze their design and evaluate their scores for all of the necessary components.

Warwick Valley High School

As we approach the end of the academic year, our specialized elective courses culminate in standardized assessments during the first two weeks of May. AP students take national exams that can ultimately transfer into college credits. AP courses offer students opportunities to challenge themselves with college-level work. Beginning in the 10th grade, we offer 11 AP courses, and we have a total AP enrollment of more than 650 students, some of whom are enrolled in multiple AP classes. Course offerings include English literature and writing, history, science, mathematics, and computer science. Next year, we will add AP Music Theory for the first time.

Students enrolled in the second year of our Cosmetology, Criminal Justice, and Video Production programs took the National Occupational Competency Testing Institute (NOCTI) exams last week. The exams are developed to meet industry standards and requirements and measure students' knowledge, skills, and competencies critical for success outside the classroom.
