The Warwick Valley Central School District Board of Education recently approved the proposed 2023-24 academic year budget. The budget meets the District's goals of preserving student opportunities while staying within or below the tax cap. It is the eighth time in the last 12 years the tax levy is below the state's allowable tax cap. The District has never exceeded the tax cap.

The District is anticipating high inflation in the upcoming school year after adjusting to record inflation during this past year. This proposed 2023-24 school year budget accounts for rises in contractual obligations; pupil personnel and special education services; inflation in supply costs, utilities and materials in all facets of the District; more expensive contract transportation; and the addition of a fifth police officer for afternoon dismissal and after school activities.

We will always have uncontrollable outside factors, such as changes in state aid, unexpected expenses, or rising costs. But, as a District, we are committed to planning for the future for our students and families. Despite these challenges, the District is optimistic that it can continue to provide high-quality education while maintaining a reasonable tax levy increase for residents. The proposed tax levy increase for next year is 3.49%, which is nearly one percentage point below the allowable state tax cap to save taxpayers \$631,157.

The budget will enable the District to sustain its impressive return on investment for our community. The District's students are arguably the highest performing in the region, as evidenced by their high test scores across nearly all categories in Orange County that we discussed a few weeks ago. In addition, the District boasts an impressive five-year graduation rate of 97%, making it the top-ranked district out of 43 in the Mid-Hudson region, with a student count of at least 105.
