The Warwick Valley Central School District is in its second summer of hosting the Warwick Police Department Junior Police Academy. For students ages 10 to 15, the program emphasizes public service and leadership. It teaches civic engagement and local government while showing junior cadets what law enforcement training entails. It also gives them a glimpse into a career in law enforcement, the legal process and emergency services. We appreciate this meaningful community partnership with Warwick Police. It consists of two two-week sessions for 40 junior cadets. The first is July 10-21 and the second is July 31-August 11. This summer's first graduation ceremony is Friday, where students will be recognized for their dedication, work and perseverance.

In many ways, the program's objectives align closely with the qualities outlined in our district's Portrait of a Graduate. Students learn leadership, collaborative and communication skills, as well as citizenship and problem-solving.

The academy, with its packed schedule of classroom learning and hands-on, real world experiences, is a 10-day program that includes activities and lectures led by police department members and New York State Troopers, as well as presentations and workshops by local professionals, and several field trips. Here are some of the activities.

- Meeting with Officer Derek Kerstner and his friend, K-9 Fritz.
- Processing a playground "crime scene" using techniques.
- Visiting TreEscape Aerial Adventure in Vernon, N.J., to build self-esteem.
- Touring the Orange County Emergency Services Center.
- Training at Chosun Taekwondo Academy.
- Experiencing defensive tactics and handcuffing techniques.
- Working out and learning the benefits of yoga at Vastu in Warwick.
- Learning about bicycle safety with John Jones, director of Orange County's Traffic Safety program.
- Seeing a live police motorcycle demonstration.
- Watching a New York State Police drone in action.

At the core of the program is the Cadet Creed, a set of standards that each participant agrees to uphold during their learning and training. Here is the Cadet Creed:

• As a Cadet, I will strive to improve myself physically, tactically, and intellectually at all times.

- As a Cadet, I will try to set the example for others to follow and take the initiative to do what is right.
- As a Cadet, I will respect my fellow cadets and never abandon them in a time of need.
- As a Cadet, I will never lie, cheat, or go back on my word.
- As a Cadet, I will maintain my bearing and keep my appearance to a high standard of professionalism.
- As a Cadet, I will follow the rules and regulations at all times. I will obey the orders of all instructors to the best of my ability.

Here are some highlights from our summer program:

Park Avenue Elementary School

Extended School Year and Summer Academy teachers in grades 1 through 4 began the critical work of continuing learning during the 2022-2023 school year. Students engage in theme-based learning that combines summer fun with work. So, they participated in activities like parachute play and playground time but they also worked on their writing skills by writing complete thoughts in sentence form. Students continued decoding and encoding mixed short and long vowel sounds, too. Also, they worked on strengthening their math fact fluency and reviewed strategies and tools like using a number line.

Sanfordville Elementary School

Construction crews at Sanfordville Elementary School worked hard to complete the renovated roof project over the summer. In addition, the newly constructed bathrooms will also be built by the fields for use by our students during outdoor physical education classes and recess. In addition, they will be built for athletes and spectators at our high school sporting events on campus. Students will be excited once the Sanfordville playground updates, repairs and additions are completed in fall. Some of the existing equipment will be repaired while additional units will be added for even more fun opportunities. A tremendous thank you to our Sanfordville PTA who have added to the project by donating a tire swing unit and an inclusive music board station to the area! The PTA donated two basketball posts, backboards and hoops. These posts will be installed in the back of the building for students to use during recess.
