Announcements

Community service: Students in the class of 2024 are required to complete 15 hours of community service. If your student has already completed community service hours, they can submit them towards the Principal or Superintendent community service awards (50 hrs/100 hrs). All hours must be submitted by April 12th, 2024 <u>Community Service Log google form</u>

Senior meetings: Counselors are meeting with seniors to discuss post graduation plans and review graduation requirements. Your student will receive a google invitation for their meeting. If they are applying **early action/decision** to any schools, they should let their counselor know so they can schedule the meeting sooner rather than later.

Transcript: Your student will receive a copy of their transcript at their senior meeting.

- Technical College / Trade school
- Adult Education programs at OUBOCES
- Certification programs (<u>OCCC</u>, <u>RCCC</u>)
- Military (enlistment, reserves, National Guard)
- Employment / <u>apprenticeships</u>
- Gap year
- Civil service exam/jobs: <u>USPS</u>, <u>Federal jobs</u>, <u>NY State jobs</u>

Naviance & Applying to College

Naviance

Warwick uses Naviance to manage the College Application Process.

Sign in is through the district Launch Pad.

Students are expected to:

•Update Prospective & Active Applications •Complete Surveys (Senior Brag Sheet)

- Request Letters of Recommendation
- Register for and attend College Visits

Colleges I'm applying to

This is the first step in managing college applications in Naviance.

- » Students are responsible for adding schools to the colleges I'm applying to list and keeping it up to date. If your student is using the commonapp, their schools from commonapp will automatically update in Naviance when they match their accounts.
- » Students can move schools from their *colleges I'm thinking about* to your *colleges I'm applying to* list.

Teacher Recommendations

- Complete the "Senior brag sheet" (under the About Me Tab >Surveys from your school) and/or a resume or activity list; this provides a larger picture for the writer to work with.
- Your student should choose teachers (at least 2) with whom they have developed a positive relationship and whom they have shown a strong work ethic.
- Requests for letters should come from students in person.
- Students must also submit an electronic letter of recommendation request in Naviance (Colleges > Apply to College > Letters of recommendation). If a letter is from an individual outside the school, the student or recommender should submit the letter to their school counselor.
- Students should give teachers a month or greater to complete their letter.

College Visits & College Fairs

- Many colleges consider a student's "demonstrated interest" in their school into account when reviewing
 applications.
- By attending rep visits, following the college or rep on social media or attending college fairs, students are showing "demonstrated interest" in their school.
- There are many in person and virtual college events taking place throughout the fall. These events are posted in the Class of 2024 google classroom. We are hosting a college fair and financial aid night on October 18th from 6pm 8pm. SUNY is hosting a <u>multiple events</u> throughout the fall to introduce students and families to their SUNY options. SUNY Rockland is hosting a <u>college fair on Oct 26th</u> from 7pm 9pm at their fieldhouse. Over 200 schools will have reps attending.
- On the Naviance home screen under "What's New" students can view colleges that have reps who have scheduled virtual visits this fall. As of today, there are 55+ visits scheduled through December with more visits being added weekly.
 College visits are taking place during lunch (in person) and afterschool (virtually). Students register through Naviance and will have access to the virtual visit link in Naviance 30 minutes prior to the start of the visit.

College Applications

- DO NOT USE STUDENT SCHOOL EMAIL FOR COLLEGE APPLICATIONS. The school email only allows email from others in wvcsd.org
- College applications are the responsibility of the student. Parents may want to proofread applications, but the student should be the one completing the application.
- College applications are available online at individual school websites. Each school will have information regarding their application requirements.
 - <u>SUNY application</u> for all four and two year SUNY schools and some SUNY community colleges. <u>CUNY application</u> for colleges and universities in the CUNY system.
 - Common Application <u>www.commonapp.org</u> Over 1000 schools accept this application.
- Students need to be aware that there may be supplemental forms, essays, or specific documents requested to be sent with the application.
 - Self Reported Academic Record (SRAR), additional Common app school specific questions and essays.
- The Class of 2024 google classroom has a lot of useful information and forms related to the WVHS College application process, community service, scholarships and career opportunities.

The Common Applicationmatching it to Naviance

Click on the "Colleges I'm Applying to" tab under "Colleges Home".

 It looks like you are not currently able to apply to Common App schools. Match your Common App account to Naviance Student account to get started. 	Match Accounts	In the red bar, click on "Match Accounts".

When you click on Match Accounts, you will be taken to the Common Application.

You will log into your Common App account using the email that you used to create your Common App account. Once you are logged in, your Common App account and Naviance will automatically link.

Students must match their account and complete the FERPA in commonapp. Counselors are unable to submit documents unless the FERPA waiver is completed.

Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) Waiver- Common App

- Family Education Rights and Privacy Act
- In the application you'll be asked if you want to waive the right to see your confidential letters of recommendation. Waiving your right let's colleges know that you do not intend to read your letters of recommendation which reassures them that the letters are candid and truthful.
- In order for your counselor to send your school documents electronically to the Common App, this form must be completed.

Official/Initial High School Transcript

- Sent to colleges directly from school counseling office.
- It is a record of all of the courses that have been taken during high school, including failed courses and summer school courses.
- Students' three-year class rank and three-year g.p.a. is listed.
- Students' Regents scores and final exam grades are included.
- Shows senior year courses in progress.
- Standardized test scores (SAT's, ACT's, AP's) <u>ARE NOT</u> included on your high school transcript.

Transcript Request

For each school that a student applies to, students must submit a transcript request form.

The form is a google form that is posted in the Class of 2024 google classroom.

The form must be submitted to counselors at least two weeks before the application deadline.

The form requires both a student and parent/guardian electronic signature.

Once the completed form has been received by your school counselor the process of sending your official transcript and other supporting materials will begin.

Standardized test scores

Students send scores directly from the testing agency to each college they are applying to. Many schools are test optional this year due to Covid-19, check your schools to see their standardized test requirements.

- SAT scores from College Board <u>www.collegeboard.com</u> -Cumulative report
- ACT scores from ACT

- Separate report per each test date

*DO NOT USE SCHOOL EMAIL ADDRESS FOR SATs/ACTs.

Essays

- Students should author their own essays, parents are welcome to proofread (if your student desires), but the final product should be the students.
- Encourage your student to start early and to follow the directions, topic choices and deadlines.
- If your student does not seek your opinion, encourage them to seek the opinion of someone they respect for feedback.
- Students should focus on being genuine in their essay
- Some essays require that part A and part B be completed, help your student check the packet before the final documents are submitted.

Summary of Counselor responsibilities

•Presentations and individual Naviance assistance.

•Reviewing student-entered information in Naviance

•Preparing school documents required by admissions offices:

- School Profile
- Teacher recommendations and multiple other supporting school documents.
- Counselor forms and recommendation (if required)
- Current Transcript
- Submit mid-year grades once first semester grades are final.
- Submit final transcript after graduation.

Financial Aid

In order to be eligible for financial aid and grants, families must complete the:

FAFSA- Free Application for Federal Student Aid. The FAFSA will open in December 2023.

- Check college websites to see what their deadline is for the FAFSA

Additionally, families may need to complete the:

<u>CSS Profile</u>- The CSS Profile is an online application used by colleges and scholarship programs to award non-federal institutional aid. Only <u>select schools</u> require the CSS profile.

Student Athletes and NCAA

Student-Athletes NCAA Eligibility Center

What is the NCAA Eligibility Center?

• It certifies whether a prospective college athlete is eligible to play sports at Division I or II institutions.

Initial Eligibility- Initial-eligibility standards help ensure you are prepared to succeed in college. If you want to practice, compete and receive an athletics scholarship during your first year at a Division I or II school, the NCAA Eligibility Center must certify you as eligible.

Student-Athletes NCAA Eligibility Center

What makes you eligible?

- Complete a certain number of high school core courses.
- Earn a certain minimum GPA in these core courses.
- Earn a certain minimum score on the SAT or ACT (waived for the Class of 2024).
- Graduate from high school.

Student-Athletes NCAA Eligibility Center

How do you register & find additional information?

Students must register online at <u>https://web1.ncaa.org/eligibilitycenter/common/</u> and request that a transcript be sent to the NCAA Clearinghouse.
