Here are some highlights from our schools this week:

Park Avenue Elementary School

Students in the fourth grade band are busy preparing "Jingle Bells" for their first miniperformance next week. They are excited to share the progress they have made during the first few months of school. This week's lesson focused on CONFIDENCE. Students discussed various ways to demonstrate confidence when performing music in front of a crowd. It was indeed an insightful lesson. Students' resilience is strengthened; it takes confidence and resilience to perform music in front of an audience. Students learn strategies to make the experience smooth and enjoyable, both for the audience and themselves.

Park Avenue's Student Council visited the Orange County Veterans Memorial Cemetery in Goshen. They witnessed the Wreaths Across America parade on its way to the cemetery. This year our amazing student council, led by Amy Buliung and Theresa Canfield, exceeded their fundraising goal by raising more than \$3,600 to purchase wreaths for our veterans!

In art class, our kindergarten students started their multimedia collage project. They will create winter penguins using multiple artmaking techniques. Their first step was to employ a printmaking method to create a wintery themed background for the penguins. They used paint, tinfoil, and Q-tips to make a monoprint, which is a form of printmaking that produces one unique print. Next time they will use multiple sheets of colored construction paper to make a penguin collage.

Sanfordville Elementary School

The Partners in Education 3/4 classes had been diligently creating exhibit pieces for their living museum. Students created Iroquois artifacts and wrote scripts, so they could be well-informed tour guides for their visitors. Some of our students actually got into character and played the Iroquois. The student exhibits included longhouses, dream catchers, wampum belts, traditional Iroquois food, clothing, games, and explanations of how the government worked.

Our kindergarten and first grade students were treated to a Polar Express visit. Conductor John, our SES parent volunteer, read the classic book *Polar Express* to our students after they received a special golden ticket and magical bell! Students listened intently to his animated story version. Thank you Conductor John for spending the morning with us!

Ms. Lindberg's Kindergarten class has been reading and listening to stories about winter, holidays and traditions around the world. They read the story *Snowmen at Night* and discussed the different types of things they imagine snowmen could do when nobody is awake at night. As a follow-up activity, they used chalk to draw a snowman on blue construction paper. They added detail based on what we thought our snowman would do at night.

Warwick Valley Middle School

In our eighth grade social studies classes students learn about Jacob Riis' photojournalistic skills. Riis was one of the first to use flash photography to capture tenement housing and other urban areas. This helped to bring attention to social issues of the time. Riis is remembered for his

pioneering efforts in photojournalism and societal reform. He shed light on the living conditions of the urban poor and inspired a change in societal attitudes towards poverty and housing. Students have compared and contrasted the lives of children in the 1920s to the 2020s. They have been analyzing the impact of the internet and social media on their lives today. They have been engaging in activities to provoke their thinking about how life would have changed with today's technologies 100 years ago.

Our students learn in many different ways at middle school. One of those ways is through extracurricular activities and athletics. Our new club at the middle school was born of Mr. Bott and Mr. Patafio's vision to teach our students about financial literacy and thus the Stocks Club was born. The club aims to introduce the stock market to students. World-renowned investor Warren Buffett began investing at 11 (and regretted not starting sooner). Mr. Botta and Mr. Patafio want to introduce students to the S&P 500, break down its past, and analyze its long-term trends. They want students to realize the market risk but also realize its historical successes. This new club has over 60 members and high aspirations. The club is highly interested in a professional guided Wall Street tour this year. It hopes to ring the bell on the stock exchange floor in the next five years.
