Park Avenue Elementary School

Students have also been engaged in some collaborative work and communicating with each other the different strategies to solve

multi-step problems. They are continuing to gain an appreciation for the different ways that can be used to arrive at solutions.

Sanfordville Elementary School

Second-grade students were visited by Ashley Hickey from the Orange County Water Authority. She worked with students every day on a lesson that focused on water and its importance. These lessons tied in with their current science unit focusing on matter. Students had a wonderful week learning about the many forms water can be. Ms. Hickey shared a groundwater model and students learned how water exists in different bodies of water and landforms. Students traveled around as a water droplet to explore how water changes as part of the water cycle. They also applied vocabulary with various collaborative games, such as Jeopardy.

Mr. Hall came into second-grade classrooms for Agricultural Week. He read a story to the students called *I Love Strawberries*. After the read aloud the students were able to complete a hands on activity that illustrated the different stages of a strawberry's life cycle.

The school community was treated to a night filled with musical, gymnastic, dancing, and comedic performances. Our students performed their acts to a packed house. Those in attendance were treated to about 60 performances throughout the night.
