On Friday, August 30, 2024, we welcomed our faculty to the district's annual Superintendent's Conference Day. It was once again my honor to join more than 300 dedicated educators, whose enthusiasm for the coming 2024-25 academic year was palpable in the high school auditorium. Among our gathered school community that morning were 15 new teachers, our new school psychologist, and three new administrators, all of whom are excited to begin their Warwick Valley careers.

My speech this year also touched on a number of important district initiatives, including some wonderful ongoing improvements around our buildings and grounds. We looked at our district's *Portrait of a Graduate*, and how it is similar to a similar model now being adopted by New York State. We've held our Portrait as the district's North Star for many years now, and made significant progress with our assessment plans in the district, making them more balanced, more authentic, while introducing more performance tasks, problem-based learning, et cetera, to achieve what we feel is an excellent blend of traditional measures and standardized measures, and also measures that truly assess the whole student.

I would have been remiss not to mention the tireless efforts of our Buildings and Grounds team, and how they have stayed on top of capital improvement projects in every building. We took a look at a number of security upgrades that have been made across our buildings, including enhanced classroom door locks at Park Avenue and Sanfordville, along with the "hardening" of points of entry. I also reviewed some of the safety training that has gone on with our faculty and staff, and the safety protocols that have been established for emergent situations. A big thank you to our district School Resource Officers for their role.

The gym at the middle school was repainted and its floor refinished, and six skylights were replaced. There was new HVAC installed to serve the locker room. Park Avenue also enjoyed a gym upgrade, with its refinished floor! The middle school's outdoor bathrooms are also just about done, as are the outdoor bathrooms at Sanfordville. The middle school has a new lunch line, and there was new flooring installed in the main office. These are just a handful of the projects that have been either completed or that are ongoing, of which we will keep you proudly updated.

During the assembly, I was joined by our Board of Education President Keith Parsons, who thanked some of our district's longtime faculty and staff. Commemorative pins were given to those who have reached significant service milestones, beginning with five years and reaching all

the way to 30. Congratulations to all, and thank you for your years of dedication to the students and families of the Warwick Valley Central School District.

Please join me in congratulating these Warwick Valley employees on their milestone.
